A note from the CEO

Our vision is a world shaped by artists.

Writing this message from the position of Acting CEO/Executive Director, and interim steward of the organisation, as we prepare to celebrate 40 years of Next Wave in 2024, I have been thinking about 'a world' not in the singular – but always already plural. Worlds as plural, and by extension, the worlding and worldbuilding that artists actively shape in and through their practices, means possibilities.

Possibilities to learn, to listen, to witness how human and more-than-human worlds are shifting, amid climates of political, ecological, and social uncertainty.

Such worldbuilding is evident in programs such as A Rising Tide and Kickstart – recent and long-term initiatives by Next Wave that tap into this organisation's history as a launch pad for early-career practitioners and its ongoing commitment to mentorship and capacity building for emerging artists and arts workers. Initiatives that recognise the possibilities of multiple perspectives through long-form, intergenerational, intersectional, and transdisciplinary collaborations.

In 2024, Next Wave will celebrate 40 years, building on these initiatives, while reflecting on its past, present and future, including its transformation in 2021 from festival to annual programming. At the heart of this transformation is a recognition of a changed and changing arts sector, and an ongoing need to enact and model sustainable work conditions. To do so is not only a necessary investment in early-career practitioners – but a commitment to manifesting the kinds of arts organisations that our complex futures demand.

This is never easy work. Worldbuilding requires concerted and continual effort – both speculative and practical labours of care. I look forward to working with Next Wave staff and its extended community as we navigate the contours of this work.

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Background

For forty years, Next Wave has shaped the Australian arts landscape, playing a pivotal role empowering and elevating early-career practitioners, and advocating for the next generation of artists.

Incorporated in 1984 and emerging as a Narrm/Melbourne-based festival in 1985, for 35 years, Next Wave platformed and showcased contemporary, experimental, and bold new work by early-career artists through its biennial festival model – attracting local, national and international engagement.

In 2021, Next Wave took on a new strategic direction, moving away from the festival model to annual programming in direct response to artist and sector demands pre-dating the impacts of a global pandemic – including the need for sustainable working practices and the space, time and resources to support creative development.

To this day, as we head towards 40 years of operation, Next Wave's commitment has remained constant: nurturing early-career artists in the most crucial of moments as they develop their practice and skills.



Next Wave's communication channels experienced a period of flux in 2023 due to staffing changes. While this resulted in some communication gaps, the Next Wave team effectively maintained our external communications channels – including our social media accounts, our regular EDMs, and our website. Next Wave also commissioned local videographer Banalarama to produce a video series about our Producers in Residence, which to date, have been watched more than 5,000 times on social media.

Programming and Creative Development Highlights

Guided by our values of Justice, Friendship, Care, in 2023, Next Wave committed to a full program of activities to showcase Brunswick Mechanics as a space of creative development, experimentation, and community connection – for artists and a broader community of practitioners – while concurrently implementing our state and national reach.



Radical Hospitality: Kain Na Tayo! with Saluhan Collective (Brunswick Mechanics)

Kain Na Tayo! invited audiences to explore issues of climate crisis and consumption through diasporic and intergenerational perspectives – working with artists, chefs, musicians and storytellers to guide audiences through a series of installations and performances, illustrating the ingenuity of Filipino food culture.

Next Wave Festival 2020 presentations (Brunswick Mechanics and PICA)

In 2023 we presented the last two projects originally commissioned for Next Wave's 2020 festival:

Under My Tongue by Belinda Locke, which premiered at Brunswick Mechanics in July to coincide with Disability Pride Month. Using performance to unearth invisible challenges that people face in their lives every day, and drawing from anonymous submissions about real-life experiences, Under My Tongue delved into the politics of connection, the aesthetics of access, and the unseen aspects of people's identities, histories, and emotional lives.

Dead Ends and Detours by Bruno Booth, a joint commission by Next Wave and the Perth Institute of Contemporary Art. Dead Ends and Detours placed audiences in a wheelchair and demonstrated that disability is not a dirty word. Playful and subversive, this interactive outdoor installation invited passers-by to compete in an obstacle course in the Perth Cultural Centre.

Dead Ends and Detours

Completion of TIDAL research commissions (Mission to Seafarers and online)

TIDAL launched in 2021 as a new major commissioning program responding to the provocation 'art as public space' and the locality, community and cultural context through long-form research, development, iterative outcomes and artist-led interventions into civic infrastructure – involving artists Aaron Claringbold, Eliki Reade, Jack Mitchell, and Rebecca McCauley.

Our TIDAL research commissions wrapped up in May 2023 with *To pitch a tent, to pull it back down* at Mission to Seafarers – an exhibition about language, mapping, and the power in withholding or sharing knowledge; of artmaking and the sacred, and what it means to relate to a place in shifting times – and <u>a collective essay published on the All School website</u>.





<u>Standing here together with everything</u> <u>that we carry</u>

(or, Prop Joe's Terraforming Platform)

We have been talking a lot about redaction

About the things we withhold in order to protect our inner worlds. We have been reflecting on what it means to make work that balances the tension between generosity and protectiveness. Together, we have been thinking through the ethics behind sharing knowledge through artmaking; of Hidden Knowledge vs Public Knowledge vs Stolen Knowledge, and how to safely traverse the Commodification of Knowledge. Of what it means to share, borrow, or pirate from each other or from ourselves — or to make together, like a tasty pasta dinner.

[Beware: you need permission to sail some owledge through these waters]

In 2021 we were approached by <u>Next Wave</u> to undertake research and make new work collaboratively, with the central pillar of our shared interests being an engagement with place, in particular with water. Since this time, we have been watching a <u>curatorial wave</u>;[1] and have been thinking through *what* is forefronted when work about water, rivers and oceans is presented in art spaces. We have been asking <u>why art</u> — and questioning where the lines lie between activism; journalism; re-presentation; and work that <u>stops us in our tracks</u>.

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
Completion of Producers in Residence commissions

The Producer in Residence program, generously supported by VicHealth through their Future Healthy initiatives, was established in partnership with Next Wave to amplify the voices and ideas of young Victorians to dream, build and connect in and through arts and cultural experiences.

In 2023, the Producers in Residence program saw three artists (Leigh, Tarryn and MaggZ) embark on a year-long journey of designing and curating projects with/for/by young people. Between them, bringing relationships across communities, knowledge across waacking, writing for theatre and TV, visual art and storytelling, and explorations into identity through the work of remembering, reclamation, regeneration, and revitalisation.



All School is an artist-led learning program by Next Wave, designed to facilitate knowledge sharing and idea swapping.

All School returned in 2023, kicking off the year of programming with All School *CRIT CLUB* events held simultaneously in Melbourne, Canberra and online. 2023 also saw us facilitate our first All School *EXCHANGE* – taking five Next Wave artists to Larrakia Country/Darwin for MarketMarket, as part of Darwin Festival.

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Completion of 2021-2023 Kickstart program and Artistic **Directorate term**

Next Wave is focused on building stronger, more collaborative, and sustainable experiences for early-career artists and their communities.

Operating for 20 plus years, Kickstart is a long-form residency program (18 months) that prioritises time and relationships, and that supports early-career artists to dream and make where they are, in place, within their context and communities. In 2021, Next Wave welcomed the following artists through to our Kickstart cohort: Delali Zevon-Aniakwah (ACT), Jocelyn Tribe (NT), Rachael Anderson (SA), Kartanya Maynard (TAS), Devika Bilimoria and Amias Hanley (VIC), Ivy Mutuku (VIC), Prue Stevenson (VIC), Elham Eshraghian-Haakansson (WA), Rhanjell Villanueva (QLD) & Re-Right Collective (NSW). These artists were mentored by our Artistic Directorate.

Kickstart 2023 showings included:

- Burial by Kickstart artists Devika Bilimoria and Amias Hanley (presented at Brunswick Mechanics, Narrm/Melbourne, 15 February 2023)
- Anvár by Kickstart artist Elham Eshraghian-Haakansson (presented in Yagan Square, Boorloo/Perth, during March/April 2023)
- Fiddle, Twiddle and Tune by Kickstart artist Prue Stevenson (presented at XYZ Studios. Narrm/Melbourne, 5-6 October 2023)

Our 2021-2023 Artistic Directorate also wrapped up their term in August 2023. Over the past two years, our 8 Artistic Directors (Amaara Raheem, Daley Rangi, Dominic Guerrera, Kristi Monfries, Naina Sen, Nathan Stoneham, Theia Connell and Tian Zhang) curated events and mentored a Kickstart artist, offering local perspectives on practice and communities across the country.



Launch of Young Artistic Directorate: A Rising Tide

A Rising Tide is a leadership and curatorial development program, initiated in partnership by Next Wave and VicHealth and involving four early-career practitioners, Banda, Matisse Laida, MaggZ, and Lydia Tesema—collectively known as the Young Artistic Directorate.

A Rising Tide encourages experimentation and risk-taking in curating, community building and culture-making, and is guided by Next Wave's Young Creative Lead, Nickila De Silva. A Rising Tide emerged in response to a sector need for mentorship and capacity building for earlycareer artists and community organisers. This includes learning how to advocate—as an earlycareer practitioner-for accessible, culturally safe, and ethical working conditions, and how to navigate presumptions about young people that can negatively impact early-career participation and engagement in the arts.

As a convener, Next Wave—whose values are grounded in justice, friendship, and care—supports this through several methods: intergenerational and transdisciplinary collaborations, long-form and intersectional relationship building, and exploring experimental practice. Sometimes this looks like sharing food, hanging out and making art together.

As an inaugural program, A Rising Tide taps into Next Wave's commitment to support a world shaped by artists, and its forty-year history as a launch pad for early-career practitioners.


